

## **MEMBER UPDATE**

The following provides an update on PARC and the activities surrounding our organization and the properties we own.

### THE FINGERHUT PROPERTY

With the passing of our tenant, Tony Cholet in July 2017, some of PARC's efforts have been focused on trying to upgrade the Tony Cholet House. We named this facility in honor of Tony and his contributions to PARC. There are no plans to rent the property as a residence, instead we have started some minor renovations so that it may be used for storage and as added lab space. New rugs were donated by Linda Krieg for two of the rooms and are greatly appreciated. The floor, walls, and ceiling of the unneeded shower stall in the bathroom were removed and will be replaced to create a small storage closet. During the last couple of summer field seasons, Professor Mary Vermilion of St. Louis University (SLU) has used Tony's house for storing field equipment while conducting excavations on the nearby Fingerhut Tract as part of her SLU archaeological field course. The house is also serving as a staging area for materials and notes that are being transferred to the Illinois State Museum (ISM) resulting from ongoing excavations at Cahokia as part of PARC's commitment to the Cahokia Mounds Museum Society's (CMMS) volunteer summer field program.

Since purchasing the Fingerhut property in 1997, the main house (the Fingerhut House) has been used to process materials coming in from the field excavations being conducted at Cahokia Mounds for the CMMS volunteer program, as well as ongoing excavations by Washington University PhD students, Caitlin Rankin and Grant Stauffer, as part of their dissertation field research at Cahokia Mounds. Board member Larry Kinsella has also been processing flotation samples collected during excavations by various researchers.

Our primary focus in the upcoming year will be to clean and reorganize the collections, notes, and other materials within the Fingerhut House so that they can be transferred to the Illinois State Museum. We want to thank members of the Cahokia Archaeological Society who wash artifacts before most meetings each month. All the artifactual materials to date have been inventoried. Once bags of artifacts are inventoried, diagnostic artifacts such as projectile points, rim sherds, decorated ceramics and other unique artifacts are then pulled and boxed separately. The contents of each box are tabulated and the boxes are labeled. The boxes are placed in large plastic bags and once at the ISM, they are set aside for 6 months to kill any insects before being integrated in with the rest of the ISM collections. We want to especially thank Sedona Kolmer, Joy Mehrmann, and Madison Bouse for sorting and inventorying artifacts, organizing notes, and boxing materials so they can be transferred to the ISM.

Thanks also to Don Milkert, one of our volunteers, who has taken over keeping the property mowed and cleaning out the gutters. He also helps with feeding Tony's four remaining cats. Larry Kinsella has also helped with keeping the property maintained, which is very much appreciated.

Late this fall the Fingerhut property suffered a waterline break, resulting in very unexpected and large water and sewer bills. We have turned off the water in both houses and are working to locate the break that appears to be between the Fingerhut house and Tony's house. Unlike an earlier break in which the water appeared on the ground surface, we can see no visual evidence of where this break is. We, however, suspect it is in the vicinity of Tony's house. ### ST. LOUIS UNIVERSITY EXCAVATIONS

For the ninth year, Dr. Mary Vermilion from Louis University (SLU) continued St. investigations on the Fingerhut Tract behind PARC's Fingerhut house with a SLU archaeological field school. The focus has been and continues to be on the anomalies identified from a resistivity survey conducted by Dr. Michael Hargrave and more recently by Dr. Jarrod Burks of the Ohio Valley Archaeology, Inc. Most of the anomalies thought to have been Mississippian structures have been partially identified within the survey area.

# UPDATE ON THE MOUND PRESERVATION EFFORTS

This past August, Congressmen Bost (R-Illinois 12<sup>th</sup> Congressional District) and Clay (D-Missouri's 1<sup>st</sup> Congressional District) along with Senators Durbin (Illinois) and Blunt (Missouri) introduced legislation for the creation of "The Cahokia Mounds and Mississippian Culture National Historic Park" centered on Cahokia Mounds State Historic site and the surrounding National Historic Landmark boundaries (read the bill here: http://bit.lv/32vrOZA). This National Historic Park would also include the Emerald mound complex near Lebanon, Illinois, the Pulcher mound complex near Dupo, Illinois, and the Sugar Loaf mound in St. Louis owned by the Osage Nation. Additional mound groups such as East St. Louis, St. Louis, and Mitchell mav eventually be included. Additional information can also be found on
